Laura Middleton: Her Brother and Her Lover - A Classic Victorian Erotic Novel by Anonymous. COMPLETE AND UNEDITED. In the Victorian period, the quality of erotic fiction was much below that of the previous century—it was largely written by 'hacks'. Some works, however, borrowed from established literary models, such as Dickens. It also featured a curious form of social

stratification. Even in the throes of orgasm, the social distinctions between master and servant (including form of address) were scrupulously observed. Significant elements of sado-masochism were present in some examples, perhaps reflecting the influence of the English public school, where flagellation was routinely used as a punishment. These clandestine works were often anonymous or written under a pseudonym, and

sometimes undated, thus definite information about them often proves elusive. English erotic novels from this period include *The Lustful Turk* (1828); *The Romance of Lust* (1873); *The Convent School, or Early Experiences of A Young Flagellant* (1876) by Rosa Coote [pseud.]; *The Mysteries of Verbena House, or, Miss Bellasis Birched for Thieving* (1882) by Etonensis [pseud.], actually by George Augustus Sala and James Campbell Reddie; *The Autobiography of a*

*Flea* (1887); *Venus in India* (1889) by 'Captain Charles Devereaux'; *Flossie, a Venus of Fifteen: By one who knew this Charming Goddess and worshipped at her shrine* (1897) and *My Lustful Adventures by 'Ramrod'*. A novel called *Beatrice*, once marketed as another classic of Victorian erotica from the pen of the ubiquitous "Anon", now appears to be a very clever 20th century pastiche of Victorian pornography. It first appeared in 1982 and was written by one

Gordon Grimley, a sometime managing director of Penthouse International. Clandestine erotic periodicals of this age include *The Pearl*, *The Oyster* and *The Boudoir*, collections of erotic tales, rhymes, songs and parodies published in London between 1879 and 1883. The centre of the trade in such material in England at this period was Holywell Street, off the Strand, London. An important publisher of erotic material in the early 19th century was George Cannon (1789–1854),

followed in mid-century by William Dugdale (1800–1868) and John Camden Hotten (1832–1873).

The figure of the governess is very familiar from nineteenth-century literature. Much less is known about the governess in reality. This book is the first rounded exploration of what the life of the home schoolroom was actually like. Drawing on original diaries and a variety of previously undiscovered

sources, Kathryn Hughes describes why the period 1840-80 was the classic age of governesses. She examines their numbers, recruitment, teaching methods, social position and prospects. The governess provides a key to the central Victorian concept of the lady. Her education consisted of a series of accomplishments designed to attract a husband able to keep her in the style to which she had become accustomed from birth. Becoming a governess was the only acceptable way of earning

money open to a lady whose family could not support her in leisure. Being paid to educate another woman's children set in play a series of social and emotional tensions. The governess was a surrogate mother, who was herself childless, a young woman whose marriage prospects were restricted, and a family member who was sometimes mistaken for a servant.

Published by William

Lazenby, a prominent printer of Victorian erotica, *The Sins of the Cities of the Plain* is considered to be one of the first works of literature dedicated to homosexuality in the English language. "Saul, Jack Saul, sir, of Lisle Street, Leicester Square, and ready for a lark with a free gentleman at any time. What was it made you take a fancy to me? Did you observe any particularly interesting points about your humble servant?' as he slyly looked down towards the

prominent part I have previously mentioned.” Having met by chance at Leicester Square, Jack Saul, a successful prostitute—colloquially known as a “Mary-Ann” or “rentboy”—agrees to accompany Mr. Cambon to his home at the Cornwall Mansions. After sharing a meal, the two men get down to business, exploring their young bodies and devoting themselves to pleasure. Curious about Jack’s past, Cambon offers him money to share the story of his life. With a

beautifully designed cover and professionally typeset manuscript, this edition of Jack Saul’s *The Sins of the Cities of the Plain* is a classic work of Victorian erotic fiction reimagined for modern readers. *Swimming Lessons* Crooked Lane Books A superb example of Victorian erotica focusing on sexual flagellation, *The Mysteries of Verbena House*, by Etonensis, was first published as two volumes in one in 1882. Only 150 copies were issued, probably by William Lazenby, at the

price of four guineas. The first volume was issued in 1881 under the half-title: *Birched for Thieving, or the Punishment of Miss Bellasis*. The second volume and the full title appeared in 1882. As in most flagellant erotica, the plot is rather slim. Verbena House is a fashionable school for young ladies in Brighton. Miss Montes, a student from Cuba, is robbed of two golden doubloons. The nominal 'mystery' centres on the discovery of the culprit: Miss Catherine Bellasis, the

beautiful sixteen year old daughter of a Chancery barrister. During the hunt for the stolen coins, a number of other offences are detected: Miss Hatherton possesses an obscene book, John Cleland's Fanny Hill, and Miss Hazeltine has hidden a bottle of gin. The girls are condemned to be flogged by the headmistress, Miss Sinclair. Volume I is taken up with the narration of these events. Volume II is primarily concerned with the castigation of the culprits. Up until the

detection of her students' misdemeanours, Miss Sinclair, the headmistress, has been averse to corporal punishment. After deciding that the girls' are to be beaten, she seeks the advice of the school's spiritual advisor, the Reverend Arthur Calvedon, on the appropriate disciplinary procedure. A devotee of the rod, he becomes Miss Sinclair's lover. In the process, and during the course of the girls' chastisement, Miss Sinclair undergoes a remarkable conversion:

she is transformed from a maid-mistress into a lewd votary, registering a vow to become a fearless heroine of the birch, and make the sufferings of her pupils minister to her devices. The book's title hints at this lascivious metamorphosis: the psycho-spiritual transformation it represents is a deeper 'mystery' than the question of who stole Miss Montes' doubloons.
