John Henry Newman's controversial *The Church of the Fathers* is published here for the first time in more than a century. It contains some of his earliest writings on fourth-century Christianity and is

contemporary with the first Tracts of the Oxford Movement and *The Arians of the Fourth Century*. It was aimed at the general reader and is filled with extracts from the writings of the Church Fathers. In 1833 the controversial Irish Church Temporalities Bill had been enacted by the British Parliament, a Bill that proposed to abolish ten of the twenty-two sees of the (Anglican) Church of Ireland.

Newman accused the State of violating the ancient doctrine of Apostolic Succession, and in this book draws parallels between the situation facing the church in the fourth century and the Anglican church in his day. The material was first written as a series of articles for the *British Magazine*; these were then revised and published in book form in 1840. Although unpopular with many of the British Establishment, it was popular with fellow Tractarians, who 'found in it for the first time the inspiration of the lives of the Saints, as real and human as if they were still alive, as indeed they were to Newman' (Meriol Trevor). A second edition

As of January 5, 2021, the COVID-19 virus has wreaked havoc on the physical and emotional well-being of the people all over the globe. As of this date, there have been 282,000 total cases in Kentucky with 3,067 total deaths. In the United States there have been

20,900,000 total cases with 354,000 death, and in the entire world there have been 85,900,000 total cases with 1,860,000 deaths. While several vaccines have been created and are currently in the process of distribution, the world is still in the midst of this challenging crisis, a crisis which can only be compared to the Spanish Influenza outbreak of 1919 long before most of us were even born. It is expected that these numbers will rise before they begin to decline. As a professor at Asbury Theological Seminary in Wilmore, Kentucky, I like many others, was thrown into the challenge of moving classes online for most of 2020. This was a particular challenge since I was teaching two courses of Missional Formation, one in the Summer of 2020 and one in the Fall of 2020. This course has traditionally used an ethnographic component to teach students how to study a congregation through observation and interviews, but as churches moved online with social distancing and mask wearing increasing, I was left trying to figure out how to deal with this assignment in an online

format.

In the pages that follow, an attempt has been made to answer some of these questions in the light of Holy Scripture, the teachings of Vatican II, and the history of the Catholic Church. What the Catholic Church believes and teaches has also been presented briefly through quotations from documents of the Church and in the form of questions and answers given in the form of four quizzes added at the end. The word, "Church", comes from the Hebrew word 'qahal', translated by Greek word, 'ecclesia', which means gathering, assembly, people gathered together in response to God's call, people of God. The Church consists of the New People of God, constituted by the New Covenant sealed by the blood of Christ, animated by His Holy Spirit, and committed to His New

Commandment of Love. It is to be hoped that the pages that follow will help the reader to discover this reality and its significance for world peace and unity. When in 1949 Fr. Leonard Feeney, SJ accused the Archbishop of Boston, Richard J. Cushing, of heresy for holding that Jews and Protestants could be saved, he backed up his charge by producing passages from the writings of fathers of the church such as St. Augustine, of eminent theologians such as St. Thomas Aquinas, and from the decrees of popes and councils, to prove that it was a dogma of faith that there is no salvation outside the Catholic Church. Many in the Catholic Church have felt that while Feeney must surely have been wrong, the questions he raised were never satisfactorily answered. outside the church? Can the optimism of Vatican II about the universal possibility of salvation be defended as an example of homogeneous development of doctrine? Or would it be more honest to say that the Catholic Church has recognized that its previous teaching was mistaken? The author is convinced that the only way to answer such questions is by a thorough study of the history of Christian thought about the salvation of those outside the church. Ó Rev.
